Junior Warden Duties

His Jewel of Office is the Plumb,... which is a stonemason's instrument used for ascertaining the alignment of a vertical surface.

It symbolizes upright behavior among Masons.


The Junior Warden of a Masonic Lodge is the third in command of the Lodge. The Junior Warden sits in the South (symbolic of the position of the sun at midday) and is responsible for the Brethren while the Lodge is at ease or refreshment.

His position is similar to a Second Vice-President. The Junior Warden, too, may open the lodge if the Master is unable to attend the meeting.

It is the Junior Warden's duty to arrange meals for the lodge, and, typically, the 2 Stewards act as his assistants in this responsibility.

Symbolically, it is also his duty to make certain that the members do not convert their refreshment into intemperance or excess. This is a holdover from earlier days, which still remains as part of the Junior Warden's job description, even though in most U.S. jurisdictions, alcohol is barred from the lodge.

As a new Mason, you should never lose sight of the fact that in a very real sense, we, your brothers, have placed the future of Freemasonry in your hands.

Masons are expected to attend as many stated meetings, degree nights, and other activities of their lodge as their time and abilities permit. Masonic participation is mutually beneficial both to the individual Mason as well as to the other brethren of the lodge. Good fellowship is an important aspect of Masonry. The bonds that unite Masons together grow stronger with each shared moment, event, and discussion.

California Grand Master 2016

Brother Martin "David" Perry was raised a Master Mason in Silverado Lodge No. 782 of Napa on March 23, 1988. He served his lodge as Junior Warden in 1993. Following consolidation with Napa Valley Lodge No. 93, David served as Master in 1996. He continued to assist his lodge after his term as Master and was recognized with the Hiram Award in 1999.

Brother Perry has served the Grand Lodge of California for over fourteen years. In 2000, he was appointed a District Inspector and acted in that capacity for nine years. In 2008, he was appointed the Assistant Grand Lecturer for Division I and served four terms until he was elected the Junior Grand Warden in 2012. David has served on the Grand Lodge Ritual Committee, the Inspectors Training Sub-committee, and the Executive Committee. He has also been a member of the board of directors for the Masonic Homes of California, Acacia Creek, California Masonic Foundation, California Masonic Memorial Temple, and the Nob Hill Masonic Center.

David is a member of Napa Chapter No. 30, Royal Arch Masons, and has received the Royal and Select Master Degrees. He is a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies in the Valley of Oakland, Aahmes Shrine Temple, and is also a member of Saint Francis Conclave of the Red Cross of Constantine. David is a member of Silver Spray Chapter No. 59, Order of the Eastern Star.

David has been very active with the Masonic youth orders serving as a member of the advisory council for Napa Chapter, Order of DeMolay, and has received the honorary DeMolay Degree for King Solomon's Chapter. He is a past member and chairman of the advisory board for Napa Assembly No. 7, International Order of Rainbow for Girls, and has served multiple terms as Rainbow Dad.

David has been active in the Hopewell Baptist Church and Napa Valley Baptist Church where he has served as a Sunday school teacher, director and trustee.

He has spent his career as a building service contractor throughout the Napa Valley.

David lives in American Canyon with his wife, Jeanette. They have two adult children, Nicholas, who is a Senior DeMolay, and Courtney, who is an active Rainbow Girl serving this year as a Member of the Grand Executive Committee, Color Bearer and Representative to Colorado and Nevada.
