

Jobs Daughters

Our Bethel is GROWING!!! Tuesday, March 11 we will hold initiation of 3 girls, and a JD2B member. We would love our Eastern Star brothers and sisters to come and see the daughters perform this beautiful ceremony.

This spring brings about more travelling for our girls. Between helping with Initiations as far away as Grass Valley and Yuba City, and driving all the way down to Southern California with our Grand Senior Custodian, Maureen Murphy-Tyler, our girls have logged more miles in the past couple of months than most people do all year!

When they are not travelling, they will be busy planning our sister, Maureen's, reception, which is on Sunday, April 27, at 2:00 p.m., at the Elk Grove Lodge. Chapter members are welcome, and encouraged to attend. Also during March and April, expect to receive flyers and phone calls from our young ladies about fundraisers they are hosting, which mitigate Bethel and personal costs to their annual convention, Grand Bethel, held in late-June in Visalia. The Honored Queen is currently taking clothing and shoe donations to turn in for cash April 9. A week later, the girls will hold a rummage sale at Kerr Middle School on Elk Grove Blvd. They would appreciate any donations, and will even arrange pick up and storage before the event.

The girls also plan to participate in the Masonic Family booth at the Western Festival over the first weekend in May. They will also march in the parade on the Saturday of that weekend. At the booth, there will be pamphlets and flyers about Job's Daughters, the Supreme fundraiser, H.I.K.E. Foundation, and this year's Grand Philanthropic Project, Direct Relief. The girls will also provide the materials for younger festival-attendees to make flower pens, which has been a great ice-breaker, in the past, to begin a conversation about our beautiful Order.

Rainbow Girls

As we move into Spring, it's an exciting month for Elk Grove Rainbow. March has us preparing for Grand Assembly, which is our annual convention held in Fresno. Our three Grand Officers will have to relinquish their stations, but I know the memories they have made the last 12 months will be carried with them for the rest of their lives.
