There is a term many of us came across this year - the now infamous but necessary 'social distancing.' Since March, we have been encouraged to keep away from other humans, wear face masks in public spaces and increase awareness to our own (but mostly our neighbor's) personal hygiene. This "new custom" of ours was actually widely used during the pandemic of 1918, when many schools and businesses closed, and all public events were cancelled, which is a comparable response to today's affairs.

The influenza virus pandemic is conventionally marked as having begun in March 1918, was persistent and wiped out a huge proportion of the globe during its deadliest second wave in the autumn of 1918. A third wave came in the winter of 1919, however, by summertime of that year, very few cases were reported.

So, what have we learned from the 1918 pandemic? That preventative measures - however difficult and limiting - do make a difference in slowing the spread of diseases. That no matter how developed a health care system can be, there will still be problems. Yet, positively, we can be 100% certain that all pandemics do all come to an end.

Historically, global situations like a pandemic have forced us humans to break with our past and rethink our world. And, believe me, our present life circumstances are no different. 100 years ago, we celebrated the dedication of our brand new Masonic Temple to the Brethren and to the public of Sacramento; and then we launched ourselves into an intense and euphoric "roaring 20's." We improved on. We evolved. Imagine - if you will - that we are about to step through a long aisle or porch, a gateway between one world and the next. Together, we are about to cross a bridge to our new future. We are about to experience our own roaring 20's...

Under the wisdom and counsel of Worshipful **Jared Yoshiki**, after several hours of discussion and deliberation, the leadership of our Lodge has decided to seize this opportunity and agreed to move forward with our traditional practices of electing and installing Officers. **Washington Lodge No. 20** will be hosting Election in November, and will install a new line of Officers in December, either in-person (in case we suddenly wake up from this very bad dream and find out that COVID-19, riots and fires never really happened), or that - this being our most likely scenario - Election and Installation of WLN20 Officers will be conducted online. Please, stay tuned for more information on when and how. Your participation in this process will be greatly appreciated.

Moving forward in our journey, through this perpetual **Masonic Odyssey** of steady advancement and relentless search for innovation, is an important step that - in the words of Brother Junior Warden **Russ Tomas** (see next page) - will allow us to regain a much-needed sense of control over at least one aspect of our lives.

The decision among the Pillar Officers wasn't an easy one. We discussed the pros and cons of such a move. In the end, we made a decision based on what we think will be best for the Lodge.

One motivating factor was the ability to control at least one aspect of our lives. As opposed to what is happening outside of our lives that is not in our control, moving forward in the line allows us to be able to take control of one of the few things we have control of. Another reason was the unknown aspect of our future. We don't know how long it will take for this pandemic to end. Would we remain stagnant if we are in the same place one year from now? Again, this decision was not made lightly, but we Masons must work to engage with our fellow Brothers.

You may be asking how we will have an election or installation of officers. Thankfully, Brother Senior Warden **Francisco Marques** was able to watch a Grand Lodge presentation in which they announced they are ready to move forward with their line with usage of modern technology for the Election and Installation of Grand Officers, which will be passed down to the Lodge Level – should they choose to move forward.

We can all agree we want what's best for the lodge. Moving forward is the best direction we can go, and with the help of our fellow Brothers and Grand Lodge, we will be able to secure a small part of our future.



Important Update from the Grand Master

As we begin a new summer month, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to spread across our state. Over the past week, California has set daily records for new coronavirus infections-more than 7,000 on June 23 and more than 8,000 on June 30. As of today, more than 240,000 cases and 6,000 deaths have been reported in our state.

This sobering news has prompted me to remind us all that on March 18, I directed that there be no Masonic gatherings of any kind in California until further notice from me. That directive remains in effect today.

While some government restrictions relating to the COVID-19 pandemic have been relaxed, California and nearly all counties continue to prohibit or significantly limit non-essential gatherings. California Department of Public Health directives still prohibit all professional, social and community gatherings. The state notes that these gatherings pose an especially high danger of transmission and spread of COVID-19.

In light of this information, my March 18 directive remains in effect in all respects: there shall be no Masonic gatherings of any kind in the state until further notice from me.

- My directive continues to include all Masonic Organizations and Youth Orders.
- My directive continues to apply to both indoor and outdoor gatherings.

My March 18 directive also outlined a special procedure for lodges regarding their payment of essential lodge bills that cannot be reasonably deferred. This special procedure also remains in effect until further notice from me.

Thank you for your continuing dedication to the craft and diligence in complying with my directive. I will update you again as soon as warranted but certainly by the first week of August. Until then, stay safe and best wishes this holiday weekend.



iMember 2.0 is here. Get started today!



Two months in, nearly 85 percent of California lodges have already begun to access their portals in iMember 2.0, the new membership platform—one of the highest adoption rates of any grand lodge jurisdiction on the system. Yet with so many new features just a finger-swipe away—and many more being prepped for launch this fall—there are still lots of questions left to be answered, starting with some of the most basic.

How to Get to iMember 2.0

iMember 2.0 is designed to work on any mobile phone, tablet, or desktop or laptop computer with an internet connection. Simply visit freemason.org and click the "For Members" button in the upper-right-hand corner of the screen. If you haven't logged on yet, you'll need to create an account, so have your email address, membership number, and a unique password ready to go.

You Can Download iMember 2.0 on Your Phone

Yes. Whether you have an iPhone or an Android phone, you can add a home screen shortcut to access iMember 2.0 quickly and easily. To install, use your web browser to visit the site, and select "Add to home screen." The exact placement of the button will depend on your web browser (Safari, Chrome, or Firefox).
