




To Be 1 Ask 1



From the South

Brethren, it is my honor to present to you, my adventures during my travels abroad in the Middle East. Although there are many great moments to share with you all, the following are what I call “Brother Jesse’s Solis-Jacques’ Top 3 Moments.” There are:

Moment #3 Upon my first arrival to “The Rock” (undisclosed location), I did not know what to think or how to feel about the people and the culture. I was so focused on defending my identity, my safety, my livelihood and those close to me. My plan this entire trip was to stay on-base and never leave; however, my profession and position here required me to go off-base for mission essential activities. I then braced myself and took with me what freemasonry has taught me all along—brotherly love to all. I went site seeing and explored the city. I visited the grocery stores and other shopping markets called Sooks (flea markets). The entire time I observed children holding their mother’s hand at grocery stores, father’s protecting their families crossing the streets, and salesmen trying to make a sale to put food on the table and make a decent living. When I made a purchase, they held my hand reverently and humbly bowed in respect. I returned the same gesture. This brotherly, gentle gesture presented to me, eradicated all fear, all uncertainties, and all confusion. It displayed a reminder that we are not military, foreign nationals, or even natives...it reminded me that we are family.

Moment #2 Throughout history, many various cultures and sub-cultures gave birth to numerous communication styles and languages. In freemasonry, communication from mouth to ear is just one good example of our masonic language. One day, one of the most challenging communication problems came to my footstep. A military member was upset and distraught why the locals could not understand their business transactions. The local native argued, complained, and felt insulted and disrespected. The native later gave up and no longer wanted to do business with him. If this business deal does not get accomplished, it will impact the mission tremendously and ruin our relationship with them; thus, it was essential to establish and maintain our dealings. I politely asked the military member how he was communicating to him. He presented to me a detailed two-page lengthy message and how he spoke to him in a direct manner. I read his entire page of instructions and asked him to rewrite it, but this time, write it in less than 10 words that he thinks are the most important. He stated it was all important. I understood how he felt and decided to recommend the less than 10 words for him. The words were—“Good relationship and people...please, my friend lets meet tomorrow.” I also recommended that he place his hand in his heart while saying these words. He took this advice and amazingly was able to regain the native’s trust. I later explained the reasons why. In many cultures, its relationships first and business last. Natives care more about trusting you than closing a deal and making large sums of money. It’s about the people you deal with that matter most. Placing your hand on your heart shows that you are a man of sincere feelings and affection and mean no harm. From this gesture, I realized even more how communication is extremely crucial to peace, harmony, and maintaining our plain dealings with others every day.

Moment #1 This final moment is what I found to be instrumental to freemasonry. I’ve met many men and women from all over the country and the world simply at one undisclosed location on our gracious planet. The theme for this adventure was “Purpose” in my eyes. What is it? How do I develop or create it? And where will it take me? My purpose was to desire new wisdom (Light).
