USS Potomac Cruise

The USS Potomac was built in 1934 as the Coast Guard cutter Electra. The 165-foot vessel, displacing 416 tons with cruising speeds of 10 to 13 knots, was commissioned as a U.S. Navy vessel in 1936, renamed the USS Potomac, and served as Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Presidential Yacht and "Floating White House," until his death in 1945.



Washington Lodge has contracted with the Potomac Association to provide a cruise on the FDR Presidential yacht USS Potomac. This will be a 3 hour historic cruise of the three bridges of San Francisco Bay on Saturday, July 24. The day trip is open to all family and friends. Our motor coach will depart from the Scottish Rite Masonic Center, 6151 H Street at 8am and return by 5pm. The cost is \$75 per adult. Children up to 12 are \$60.

From the South Michael P. Quinn, Jr. Warden





Member Profile



Philip A. Hardiman, P.M. Grand High Priest, Royal Arch Masons of the State of California

Philip Alan Hardiman was born on February 18, 1945, in Louisville, KY, where his father, the Mason's mason, was stationed at Ft. Knox. At 10 months, he moved to his father's homeland, Sacramento, CA, per force, where the young family grew over a 13 year period to include two brothers and two sisters.

He attended public schools, graduating High School as valedictorian, and attended numerous California colleges and Universities (Sacramento City College, UC Berkeley and Davis) finally graduating after 15 years with a BS in Mathematics at California State University of Sacramento (CSUS).

He had his first child (Edward) while a Sophomore at UC Davis and his second (Judy) while a Junior at UC Berkeley. Though a student at Cal during the tumultuous Free Speech era, he remained apart from the demonstrations – unsympathetic with the radicalism but also too busy working full-time while carrying a full course load and building a family. He dropped out of school as a Senior, for a number of years until 1973, and worked as a life Insurance "debit agent", principally for Met Life and John Hancock. During this time, he added two more children to the burgeoning family (Paula and Frederick), and then went to work with the State of California as a Computer Programmer Trainee in 1970. The Employment Development Department (EDD) helped Phil complete his education, and he finally graduated from CSUS in 1977.

In this same year, Phil and his brother Ricky were initiated, passed and raised by their father, Edward, when he was Master of Washington #20. Phil rose to Master of Washington #20 in 1985, during which time he also joined the Scottish Rite and Shrine. Also, during this time, the last two children were added to the family (Jeffrey and Patricia). In 1986, Phil's marriage ended, and not too long thereafter Phil began dating Nancy, a single mother. They were active with their teenage sons (Fred and Eric) in San Juan Chapter of DeMolay, and were married on February 14, 1987 – that's right, Valentines' Day, at her insistence! She is a superb grandmother, mother, and wife – the only reason Phil is a reasonably stable personality today!

Phil followed his father in plural membership to Drytown Lodge #174, where he served as Master in 1998, and again for Washington Lodge #20 in 2001. He is currently Secretary of Drytown Lodge #174, and has served Grand Lodge on the Widows, Homes Endowment, and Masonic Properties Committees. During the first eight years of the new millennium, Phil served as President and Secretary of the Masonic Temple Association of Sacramento. From 1993 to 1994, Phil and Nancy spent 15 months on an Intergovernmental Personnel Assignment to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. While in Alexandria, VA, Phil served as Chaplain of Andrew Jackson Lodge #120, where he retains dual membership today. During this time, also, Phil had the distinct privilege and pleasure of raising his three sons - Edward (1988), Frederick (1998), and Jeffrey (2008). Phil's York Rite career began in March, 1991, when he took the degrees and orders in Vallejo. He served as Illustrious Master of Sacramento Council #1 in 2003, High Priest of Sacramento Chapter #3 in 2004, and Commander of Sacramento Commandery #2 in 2005. He is a member of San Francisco Priory No. 38 and Golden Redwood Priory No. 82, Knights of the York Cross of Honour. In addition to the Masonic organizations already mentioned, Phil is a member of Allied Masonic Degrees, Royal Order of Scotland, National Sojourners, Heroes of 76, Eastern Star, Order of Amaranth, Sciots Tract Pyramid 11, and the Saint Francis Conclave of the Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine. He also served in the 1980s as Chapter Dad for San Juan Chapter, DeMolay, and in the 1990s as Chairman for the Verta Linda Chapter, DeMolay.

His non-Masonic activities have included numerous family camping and hiking trips. He is an avid cribbage player. He also coached Little League baseball for 15 years. Phil retired at the end of 2005 from EDD as a Research Manager, after 35 years. Nancy has also retired after more than 40 years in accounting and office management. They look forward to many happy years in the future, traveling and interacting with their large family – seven children and 20 grandchildren.

Some very important questions will be addressed at this meeting. Would lodge consolidations be healthy for the Craft? Is there a need for a Traditional Observance Lodge in the Sacramento area? Can our area support 12 or 13 lodges?
